Welcome to the 2021 DREAM Alive annual report. This past year brought us much growth and new opportunities. We served more students than ever before, added staff and programming, returned to in-person programming in the fall, and received grants from major benefactors. Here are some key 2021 highlights. More details can be found throughout this report.

- **Record number of youths served: 756**
- **Record number of volunteers: 146**
- Added a new site, Urban Act Academy, to serve more middle school youth
- Doubled our full-time staff from three to six
- Corporate partnerships increased to a record high of 68
- Continued our 100% high school graduation rate for the 10th straight year

This growth in program outcomes would not be possible without our amazing staff and the financial support from our generous partners, donors, and volunteers, all of whom can be found and recognized in our annual report. While each partnership is vital to impacting youth, I believe it's worth mentioning our gratitude in receiving a significant grant from the Lilly Endowments Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis initiative in 2021. The \$631,490 grant was awarded in April 2021 and will be used over the next three years to grow and enhance current programs and to help make DA's services replicable in more schools across Indianapolis.

We've taken that first replicable step by launching a new site at Urban Act Academy, our first new middle school in eight years. The school on Indianapolis' near-east side is a perfect site for us to grow. It serves students and families on the same side of town as our other two middle schools, and most of their students end up attending the same IPS high schools DREAM Alive already serves. We were also grateful to return to in-person, on-site programming in the fall, which includes field visits and after-school sessions. We served 391 students in-person in our first semester.

While these highlights show the great strides DA achieved in 2021, we continue to need the support of our generous volunteers and corporate partners. More programming brings with it the need for more mentors and volunteers. Our middle school scholars are starving for relationships, and our high school scholars are searching for mentors. Please continue to remain involved via volunteer and corporate partnership opportunities.

We look forward to growing together with you in 2022 and beyond. Thank you so much for all you do to support DREAM Alive as we continue changing lives and making dreams.

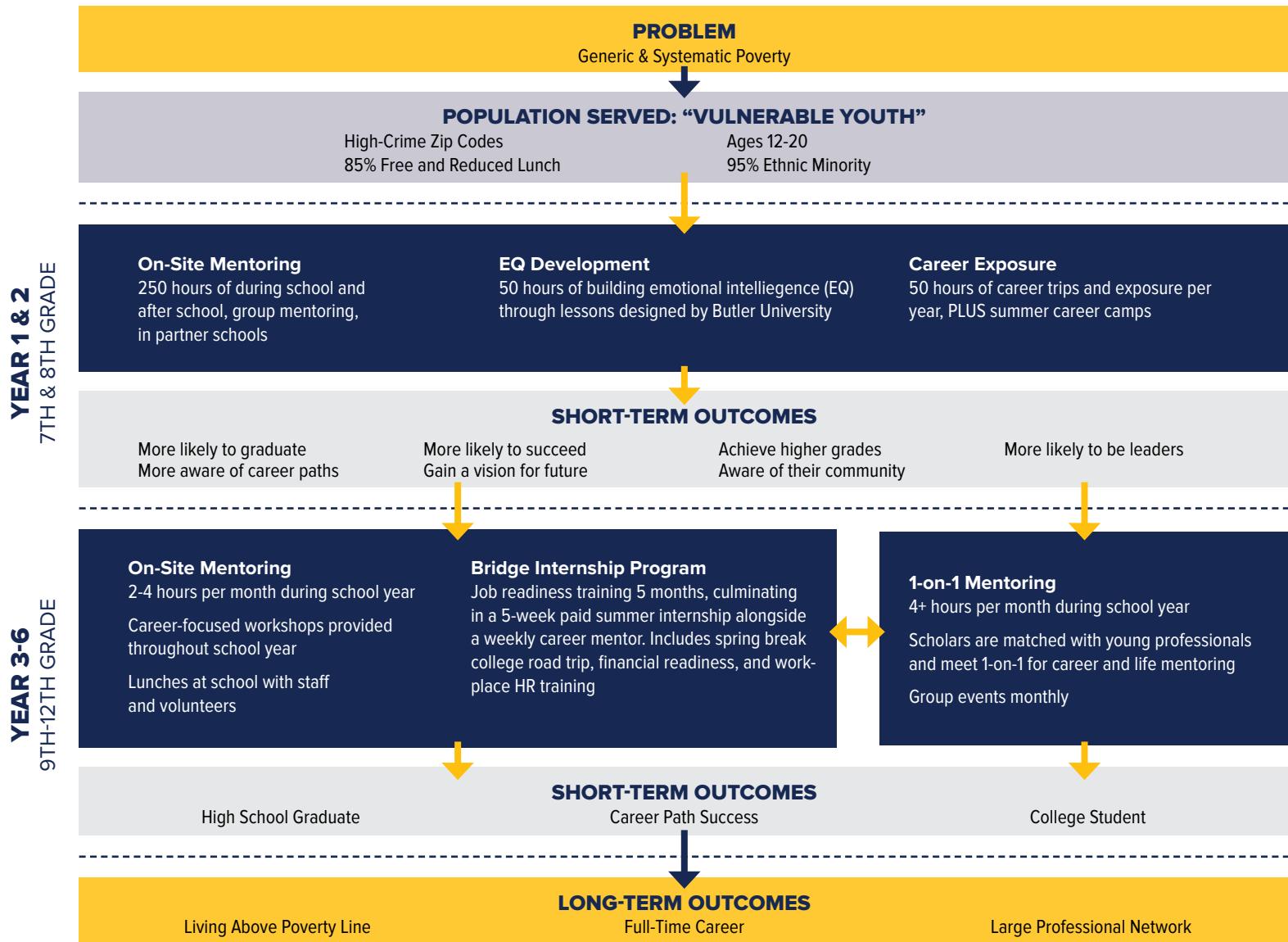

DREAM CHRISTMAS DELIVERS JOY

Our 17th annual DREAM Christmas provided holiday presents to 86 Indianapolis elementary school-aged children. This year we provided gifts for children attending Theodore Potter Spanish Immersion School 74 on Indianapolis' east side. In-person shopping trips for our scholars to purchase gifts for their sponsored children returned in 2021 thanks to generous sponsors and volunteers stepping up to make the event possible at Meijer. Our scholar shoppers received budgeting tips from Regions Bank staff to make every dollar count when shopping.

Nine in-person wrapping parties also took place at which scholars joined with volunteers to wrap their presents. Many volunteers joined with DREAM Alive staff to meet at Midtown Church to pick up the wrapped presents and deliver them to gift recipients and their siblings. Our scholars presented one special gift to their child during a DREAM Christmas celebration on December 14 at Harshman Middle School. Everyone enjoyed music from a DJ, food, photo booth for selfies, and crafts. PROGRAMMING EXPANDS IN 2021

DREAM Alive made big strides in our programming for 2021. We upgraded our technology for better relationship management with our scholars, which leads to better service. We can see at a glance the number of sessions a scholar has attended and the progress scholars are making. We also went all virtual for applications, permission slips, waivers, and communications with parents.

By adding Jessica as a volunteer engagement director, we recruited 146 volunteers in 2021, our most ever. Jessica and Penny, our operations directors, teamed together to schedule career trips for every week of the fall 2021 semester, our most ever as well. In 2022, we will have nearly 34 trips before May 2022! This means many more experiences for our scholars and new career paths to explore.

Our senior scholars also have more access than ever to next-step opportunities beyond high school. Our seniors can access college scholarships, pursue a military career, or land full-time jobs with partner companies.

Most of all, we were super excited to return to in-person sessions at our four sites and the possibilities of expanding our in-person offerings in 2022.





DREAM ALIVE LAUNCHES SCHOLAR STORIES

POSITIVE. POWERFUL. LIFE-CHANGING.

These are the outcomes depicted in our new scholar stories video series. The first video, Salma's Story, launched in late December 2021. Salma shares her DREAM Alive journey and the impact DREAM Alive has had on her life.

Salma found herself struggling academically in seventh grade. "I didn't think about my education or my future. I was just kind of lost," Salma says in the video.

Salma's English teacher recommended the DREAM Alive program and Salma soon joined. DREAM Alive partnered her with a mentor named Melissa. They built a relationship and explored ways for Salma to achieve her dream of owning a houseplant business with a coffee house vibe. DREAM Alive's programming and mentorship gave Salma the tools to improve in school and the confidence to attend the University of Indianapolis to study entrepreneurship.


Salma says this about her life before and after DREAM Alive. "It's just an environment that you're in and you get sucked into it. DREAM Alive shows you there is something other than that and helped me think about my future."

Together, we can make a difference. Together, we can build a healthy community. Together, we can change lives. Together, we are DREAM Alive.

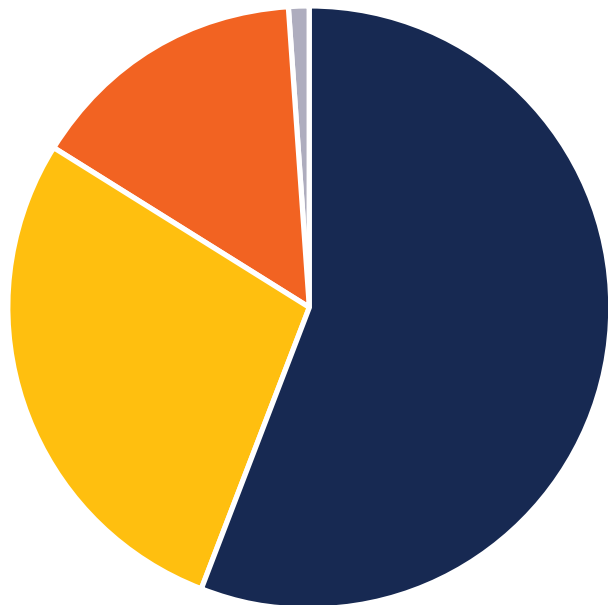

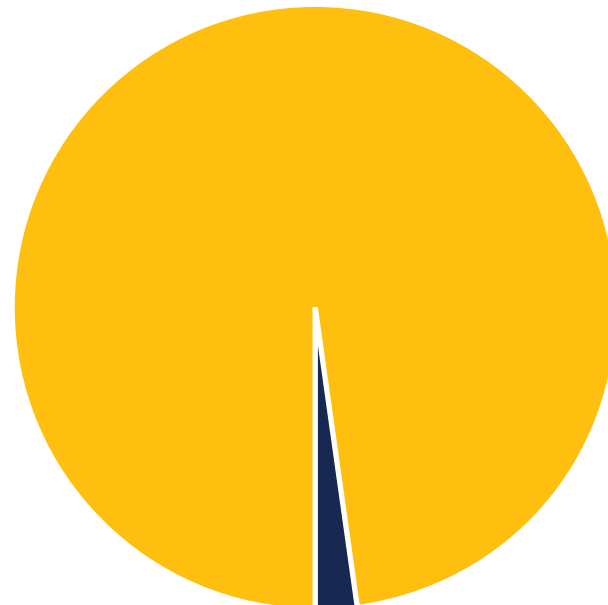
KEY SOURCES OF DONATIONS

DREAM ALIVE AWARDED ENHANCING OPPORTUNITY GRANT FROM LILLY ENDOWMENT

March 31, 2021

DREAM Alive (DA) on Wednesday announced it has received a grant of \$631,490 from Lilly Endowment Inc. through its initiative, Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis. The grant will support DA's work of growing and enhancing current programs and exploring the replicability of DA's services.

DREAM Alive is one of 28 organizations being supported through Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis, an initiative designed to improve the livelihoods of individuals and families facing complex and varied challenges associated with poverty and financial insecurity.

"We are incredibly humbled by Lilly Endowment's support for our commitment to more meaningfully reach and serve youth throughout the Circle City," said Eric Müller, DREAM Alive's Executive Director. "The financial support this grant provides will be transformational in allowing us to do that. We look forward to stewarding this opportunity to further develop young leaders, inspire them to career paths, and encourage them to achieve their dreams."

DA currently serves students in Indianapolis Public Schools, and, with the strong collaborative support of nearly 60 organizations in Indianapolis, mentors vulnerable youth helping them to identify and achieve their career dreams. Founded by retired Indianapolis Colts player Tarik Glenn, DA has a 100% high school graduation rate since 2010. The organization has had limited capacity to reach and serve additional youth due to limited resources. LEI's Enhancing Opportunity initiative aligns with the organization's strategic plan, addressing those needs with an expansion of high school partnerships and professional and volunteer resources.

"We are grateful for the tremendous response we received from the Indianapolis community during a time when organizations were called upon to significantly ramp up their existing programs and services in response to the acute needs brought on by the COVID-19 crisis," said Rob Smith, Lilly Endowment's senior vice president for collaborative strategies. "We believe that the projects being funded through this initiative have the potential to improve the lives of a significant number of Indianapolis residents facing the challenges of poverty and financial insecurity."

Lilly Endowment launched Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis in 2019 because poverty and financial insecurity have been persistent challenges in Marion County. Research has indicated that around 20 percent of residents in the city have been living in poverty and an additional 20 percent have been living close to poverty and struggling to make ends meet.

Through Enhancing Opportunity in Indianapolis, Lilly Endowment invited eligible organizations to consider how they would work comprehensively with other community partners and employers to help residents make progress toward achieving lasting economic self-sufficiency. Due to the number of high-quality proposals Lilly Endowment received and the compounding challenges COVID-19 brought to bear on already vulnerable individuals and families, Lilly Endowment nearly doubled its initial funding commitment to more than \$93 million.

ABOUT DREAM ALIVE

DREAM Alive (DA) is a local nonprofit which helps break the cycle of poverty by mentoring at-risk youth from 7th grade through 12th grade, helping youth discover career paths. DA was originally founded by retired Indianapolis Colts' Tarik Glenn in 2001. Serving over 500 youth per year, DA boasts a 100% high school graduation rate and an 89% career path placement rate.
